THE TIME OF THE SINGING OF BIRDS

'Flowers appear on the earth...the time of the singing of birds has come.'

The well-known passage from the Song of Songs, often chosen these days for weddings, comes into its own at this time of year. These are the weeks of Eastertide. May, traditionally, is Mary's month; England is 'Mary's dowry.'

Through the Sundays of Eastertide we celebrate the various fragmentary accounts of the experience of the early Christians, that Christ is risen from the dead. Outside an empty tomb in the half-light; or at a meeting of his followers later that day in an upper room in Jerusalem; travelling on the road to Emmaus, or at dawn on the lakeside: the experiences are unexpected and fleeting, but the result is the same. Followers who were shattered, frightened, disappointed and disillusioned find new life, new hope, new energy and new joy, and bear witness together to the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead.

In our world, this spring time, there are again signs of fragmentary hope, and promise. The first Easter morning did not erase the memory of all that had happened, especially on Good Friday. The past is 'a given', whatever we might say of the present and the future. But a new depth of meaning was revealed, and a new perspective.

At the time of writing, news of the war in Ukraine continues unabated, with evidence emerging of atrocities and appalling devastation in areas which have been occupied or have suffered military attack. Whatever the future holds, nothing can wind the clock back on that. But we have seen in recent weeks how the spirit of the people there lives on, in spite of incredible odds. Metropolitan Epiphany Dumenko, head of the independent Ukrainian Orthodox Church, told a congregation in Kyiv at the end of March: "Although a heavy cross has fallen upon us, we must bear it with dignity, following Christ until we achieve victory - a spiritual victory over the evil brought to our homeland. By the power of God's truth and mercy, by the power of our people's love, sacrifice and faith, Ukraine - still wounded, tortured and crucified by its enemies - will be resurrected."

Please remember, this Eastertide, all for whom these are testing and difficult times: from those in our own land increasingly resorting to food banks like the ones in Ledbury and Hereford, to those in Ukraine and the many who seek a place of refuge and safety, having been forced from their homes. Please consider whether you might be in a position to offer accommodation for six months or more to a family from Ukraine (typically a mother and child), or an individual, seeking to come to the UK. Parishes locally are seeking to link the names of potential hosts with the names of those seeking emergency aid. Details of the 'Homes for Ukraine' scheme can be found on the website www.hereford.anglican.org., or via Citizens UK. Some, I know, have already made the offer, some in Cradley, or some as part of a larger support group in Colwall, for which please contact the Revd Melanie Horton, at Colwall Church.

It's like old times writing one of these monthly reports, and it's good to be able to say to you all that every single member of the Council has been contributing greatly to its operation at this time of transition. Saying that I am grateful understates things dramatically. I have felt very well supported by everyone whilst I have been acting temporarily as Chair – a big thank you all round.

New Councillor

I am delighted to report that we have been able to coopt yet another councillor, Paul Aitken, who will join us in May, and this takes our numbers up to 8. It is lovely to have representation from the area north of the A4103, and there are still vacancies, so please put yourselves forward from any part of the parish.

Sensory Garden

By the time you read this, the grant-funded project enhancing the central area of the Chapel Lane Recreation Ground should have made significant progress, so do make use of the seating area for that morning chat or quiet contemplation in lovely surroundings.

This will be held on Tuesday, 24 May at 7.30 p.m. in Cradley Village Hall. It is a general meeting for all parishioners that the Parish Council is legally obliged to facilitate and chair, but we intend to arrange some interesting talks/presentations as part of it.

WHAT SIGNS ARE FOUR

My home village of St. Mungo Moss has altered out of all recognition in recent years. It has always been a hotbed of serious crime – maybe not as bad as Kirkmungo in Scotland, or Ballymungo in Ireland; and definitely not as dire as Midsomer Mungo, home patch of Slick's pal, Inspector Barnbaby, who has an impossible job keeping a lid on the carnage – but no, it's not the jewel robberies and the gangland gunfights that hang heavy over our sweet rural idyll. The change is in the multitude of minor felonies committed by individuals who are otherwise law-abiding, but who consider their individual rights are being curtailed. Acts of petty vandalism are especially favoured.

For illustration, some months ago a twenty miles an hour speed limit was imposed through the village, with appropriate signage erected. A welcome the improvement in road safety, according to the majority of inhabitants; indeed, such a scheme is long overdue for the old village in Cradley. For all that someone thought differently. Within a month all the speed signs were defaced with indelible paint and required replacement. Investigations proved difficult. Μv methods rely on village gossip, and I am seriously hampered by the loss of shop, school, church, village hall, and, more recently, the closure by Chief Inspector Edwina Moose of our last remaining pub and Gordon Blue restaurant, the Turk's Head. The disgraced owner - celebrity chef, Giles Bristow, has not had a television series since. The truth came out, eventually, during a typically acrimonious parish council meeting, when the chairwoman broke down in tears and admitted all. It seems she had been caught by one of those irritating speed cameras, and forced to pay a trivial fine. Not content merely to incinerate the offending camera, as any sensible person would, she had to take out her frustration on those innocent circular plaques, the instalment of which she had instigated.

Other instances include the theft of twenty-two 'Keep off the Grass' notices from the perimeter of the village green. The local wildlife enthusiasts had been hoping that, after a few years of careful mismanagement, there was an outside chance we'd get a skylark nesting amid the sward. What's the likelihood of that if everyone in the village misuses the green for afternoon strolls and ball games?

Another example of the trend was the deliberate defacement of signs erected beside every stile and kissing-gate along the numerous rights-of-way within the parish. These specifically excluded agricultural livestock from trespassing on these pathways. We are all aware of the disgusting mess a herd of cattle or sheep can make of a nice firm footpath; indeed, most of us will have taken a sample of it home on the soles of our footwear. As a village we democratically decided on this course of action, imposing a requirement on the local farmers to keep their beasts firmly under control. After all, the prime purpose of the countryside has long since ceased to be about food production.

Then there was the fate of the two metre square placards placed in prominent positions about the village, threatening legal action against anyone so mean as to leave their litter for others to clear up. They were promptly ripped to shreds, and scattered willy-nilly about the roadways, verges and the front gardens of various parish councillors.

An act of deliberate theft occurred when more than one thousand daffodil bulbs, planted with the aim of winning us a coveted 'Best Kept Village' award, were dug up and removed in the space of a single night. At first it was assumed they would turn up on offer at a car boot sale; though, any hope of identifying the purloined bulbs was scotched owing to those responsible for their acquisition in the first place failing to make a record of the varieties. However, it has since been noted that the gardens of these latter persons, previously devoid of spring flora, have unexpectedly burst into bloom.

As for those essential health and safety signs, warning people of the dangers of swimming in the Mungo Brook: well, one was cast up on a beach in the Scilly Isles only last week; the fate of the other one hundred and nine is yet to be confirmed. Those signs cost the parish council twice their annual income; and, yes, it is possible to drown in three inches of water!

On a recent visit to your rector – the woman of the house was away visiting her friend Vladimir in Moscow, or I wouldn't have dared go near the rectory I learnt of similar instances in the local area. Indeed, the problem is on the increase across the entire country. To all appearances, the population is growing less tolerant of the powers-that-be instructing them of their public responsibilities. Well, for most of us there is something that presses all the wrong buttons. For me it is those repulsive little plastic symbols telling me I am on the Something-or-other Way, or in which direction the footpath goes next: as if I'm incapable of reading a map! However, while I consider it perfectly legitimate to eradicate nasty little excrescences such as these whenever I encounter them, such is hardly the case with the previously mentioned examples of wanton destruction.

For all my superlative skills in detection, I find these crimes impossible to solve. Give me a meaty murder any day, something I can get my choppers into; but such trifling misdemeanours are not worth the time and effort involved. And the same goes for the constabulary – they are all far too busy investigating the peccadilloes of prominent politicians. So, unless there are major improvements in our society, I can only foresee the problem growing ever greater. Or, perhaps, we can stop putting up so many signs.

NEWS FROM MATHON PARISH COUNCIL meeting 30 MARCH 2022 at 7.30 p.m.

Malvern Hills Trust - Mr David Baldwin had sent in a report on MHT activities. Two further resignations from the Trust had taken place. Several workshops had been undertaken via Zoom, but the majority of the meetings were now face to face. Car park meter prices would be increased to £4.80 per day. Annual pass prices would be increased to £41 per annum plus £16 per annum for a second car at the same address. The final draft of the 5 year business plan 2022-2027 had been circulated to Trustees for consideration. The application for a Countryside Stewardship Agreement to cover MHT land at Castlemorton Common had been successful. Following final scrutiny, this Agreement was now live and an important step forward for MHT. Provisional enquiries had been received for two beacons to be lit on Trust land to mark the Platinum Jubilee of the These would be on the Queen's Coronation. Worcestershire Beacon and British Camp. 40 trees had been planted at Poolbrook and Barnards Green, hedges had been planted at Colwall Lands and memorial fruit trees had been planted at the community orchard in Townsend Way.

Queen's Jubilee Green Canopy - As a means of safeguarding the grass triangle at the end of Southend Lane, the Council proposed planting a Jubilee Sweet Chestnut Tree (donated by Cllr C Green) in the triangle. Local residents had already purchased and planted bulbs, but damage was being done by lorries using the triangle space to turn round.

Footpaths – the Council noted that Herefordshire Council was now taking over the management of PROW's from Balfour Beatty, commencing 1 April. The Clerk had completed the P3 Scheme forms.

The Footpaths Officer, Cllr K Perkins, had reported to the Clerk that the bridge on footpath MA18 had finally been mended and the footpath was now open.

Verge Cutting – 2022 - the Council considered the options regarding verge cutting. Conserving wild flowers as opposed to road safety was the key issue. The Council agreed on a compromise, and the Clerk was asked to write to Herefordshire Council requesting one cut only to be carried out at the beginning of August.

EXCERPTS FROM PARISH MAGAZINE Cradley Parish Magazine March 1898 (part 2)

My dear Parishioners,

I am sure you will have heard with sorrow, and a sense of shame, that the good name of our Parish has been brought into question by its connexion with a case brought recently before the Bromyard Bench of Magistrates, in which a Cradley youth was convicted and fined for an assault upon a young woman in the Public Road upon a Sunday evening.

The matter is one, which, from the state of things disclosed in evidence, seems to need anxious thought and decisive action on our part. I think too well of the manliness, good sense, and right spirit of the men of the Parish to doubt for a moment that if they make up their minds to deal with the evil it will be stopped. They owe it to their wives, mothers and sisters, that they shall have no fear of harm or annoyance anywhere within the bounds of the Parish at all times; and although of course the law of the land affords protection to all, the standard of public feeling and opinion ought to be such that there would be no need to resort to it. Until this is the case we shall remain discredited.

We may have contributed to it in failure in our Christian duty as Parents, Teachers, Pastors and Masters and pray to God that we see what we ought to do, and manfully to do it. There are occasions when Christian indignation, properly expressed, is a very wholesome thing; this seems one of them.

We are looking for individuals and families who can provide safe accommodation and support to young people whilst they develop the skills to live independently. Supported Lodgings is an important stepping stone for young people age 16+, who are leaving care or homeless, and have not yet had the opportunity to hone the life skills they need to move forward positively.

There is no typical Supported Lodgings Provider (SLP). We welcome applicants from all walks of life, as a diverse range of providers enables us to find the right fit for the young people we work with.

You don't need to own your home – you just need a spare room or annexe. You don't need to have had children of your own, as long as you have experience of working with young people and are able to engage with them effectively.

What you will need is patience, commitment, understanding, confidence, tolerance, flexibility, positivity and a good sense of humour. This is a rewarding but sometimes challenging role, so the right attributes are essential to provide the level of emotional support and guidance needed.

Good life experience is important too as you will need to be able to help the young person develop practical skills such as:

- Accessing further education, apprenticeships, training, or employment
- Food planning, cooking, cleaning and laundry
- · Financial management and budgeting
- Accessing housing and benefits
- · Health management

SLPs receive weekly payments to cover rent, food and utilities, the support of a dedicated social worker and other providers, and other related benefits.

Cradley WI met as usual in the Village Hall and members enjoyed being able to walk in daylight to our first evening meeting this spring. Our President, Joy Edwards, welcomed members to the first meeting in the new year's programme. The meeting was well attended by 21 members and, once we had got new subscriptions out of the way, we settled down to listen to a fascinating talk given by our village's own Community First Responder, Sarah Clarke, who told us all about her role. She gave us a demonstration of cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) and how to help someone choking. She showed us her equipment pack and we were surprised to hear that she receives no funding from Government, other charities or organisations to support her in her work. Not only are Responders volunteers, they are required to fund-raise to acquire their equipment and meet costs. We were very pleased that our speaker's fee was going to such a worthwhile cause. There were questions and lively discussion around the services for cardiac events in this area.

We are returning to normality after a couple of years of being unable to meet at the village hall due to the Although Zoom meetings kept us all pandemic. together virtually, a lot of the events that made up a meeting had to go by the wayside during this time. LETTER FROM ELLIE CHOWNS APRIL 2022

Last month (in March) I went on a 'ward tour' with Mike Brookes, our Balfour Beatty Locality Steward (ie the person who keeps an eye on the issues re the roads in our ward). It was very useful and I plan to repeat it regularly, as I used to do with the previous incumbent pre-Covid.

One of the locations we inspected was the place outside the surgery in Cradley that was recently flooded (again). By the time of our visit, the flood had thankfully been pumped out - but I was frustrated to see that the road and pavement were still covered in mud, and indeed the drains themselves were hidden under the mud. Mike agreed with me that this is simply not acceptable. A few days later, he had arranged for the mud to be scraped from the road, but the drains and the pavement were still muddy, so I chased this up again. As I write this I am on holiday for a week and have not been able to recently inspect the site, but I very much hope that by the time Cradley residents read this the mud will finally all have been removed. I am just sorry that it has taken so long... grrr...

Another frustrating issue has been the signage at the A4103 / B4214 junction at the bottom of Fromes Hill. Following numerous emails from me, temporary additional warning signs were installed here; and I continue to chase BBLP to install the permanent new signage which I hope will significantly reduce the incidence of accidents in this location. Again, I am frustrated that this has taken so long, despite me chasing it every week since January... I'm sorry about this and am trying my best to get quicker action on these key road safety issues.

Last month I started my column reflecting on the horrors of war in Ukraine and the support the county is providing for refugees. I learned this month that there are also still over 15,000 Syrian refugees in temporary accommodation across the UK following the evacuation last August. I am pleased to report that Herefordshire has taken our fair share of these refugees, and is working hard to support Ukrainian refugees too.

At the last Cabinet meeting, we approved an additional £11.49 million funding for children's social care services. This is a significant extra investment, designed to address the longstanding problems (dating back nearly ten years) in children's social care, that were highlighted by a critical court judgement in April 2021. With a new administration, a new chief executive and a new head of children's services, the council has fully recognised the need for root and branch reform. This commitment of additional funding signals the seriousness with which we are all addressing the problems. We want Herefordshire to be a place where every child is safe and well cared for.

Also at the last Cabinet meeting we approved Market Town Investment Plans for all the five Herefordshire market towns (Bromyard, Ledbury, Ross, Kington and Leominster). This is the first time



that a council administration has made a specific effort to identify investment needs and potential in the market towns.

I often say that that county's economy is like a three-legged stool: city, market towns, and rural areas – as residents of this ward know, we have many thriving rural businesses! We are currently developing a Herefordshire-wide proposal to the government's Levelling Up Fund and I very much hope that market town investment will be a central part of this.

As usual, I am running out of space! So I'll just close with a reminder about my monthly ward surgeries (just drop in, no appointment needed):



Dispensary

It helps us if you plan your need for medication ahead of time and please don't phone us to request medication except in an emergency. It isn't safe and can take longer than you might think; often the dispensers need to check with the doctor, who may be consulting and unavailable for several hours, by which time we would have missed the opportunity to order for the next delivery.

Please register to order your medication online. The system is called Patient Access (the receptionists, secretaries or dispensary staff can help you with this request). If something does not appear on your "repeat" list (there is usually a good reason for this), then just type the request in manually. We require 2 full days to action medication requests unless it is a true emergency.

World Asthma Day

World asthma day is on the 5th May 2022, to book in for an asthma check please ring the surgery to make an appointment with nurse Jenn, who specialises in asthma/COPD.

Cervical Screenings

Cervical screening to pick up early precancerous changes in the cervix is offered to all women aged 25 to 64. The actual procedure is just the same, but we no longer look at cells under the microscope. Instead the lab procedure looks for evidence of the cause of cervical cancer; the Human Papilloma Virus. This is why the name has changed from a 'smear' to 'screening'.

Bowel Screenings

We're always surprised the by (admittedly small) number of our patients (aged 60-74) who don't use government postal bowel the screening. Bowel cancer is number four in cancer frequency in the UK (after breast, prostate and lung). The screening is easy and you don't even have to leave your home!

May 1st 1927: Imperial Airways became the first British airline to serve in-flight meals to passengers. The airline was based at Croydon airport and its first services were to continental European destinations. It later developed services to Delhi, Cape Town and Australia, using flying boats.

May 2nd 1809: Dartmoor prison was opened to house French prisoners of war. They had previously been housed in derelict ships but it was considered too risky to keep them close to the dockyard at Devonport. Later American POWs were also housed in Dartmoor and the prison population grew to nearly 6000. When the wars with France and America ended the prisoners were repatriated and the prison was left empty. It was refurbished in 1850 and has been used ever since as a convict prison. It is now a category C prison (for prisoners not expected to make a determined attempt to escape) and houses about 640 inmates.

May 3rd 2007: Madeleine McCann from Rothley in Leicestershire, then aged almost 4, disappeared from a holiday apartment in the Portuguese resort of Praia de Luz. Despite extensive investigations by police in Britain, Portugal and a number of other countries, her disappearance remains a mystery.

May 4th 1926: The Trades Union Congress called a general strike in support of coal miners who had gone on strike four days earlier in protest against wage reductions. The army was called in to keep essential supplies moving and even put armoured cars on the streets to help maintain order. The general strike failed to achieve its objectives and was called off on May 12th, although the miners' strike continued.

May 7th 1954: The Russian government requested admission to the NATO alliance. Vladimir Putin revealed in 2001 that the response from the West, primarily France, the UK and the USA, was that the 'unrealistic nature of the proposal does not warrant discussion.' Putin also said that he had suggested Russian membership of NATO in the year 2000 but was refused by Madeleine Albright, the US Secretary of State.

May 8th 1885: Sarah Anne Henley, a barmaid from Easton, Bristol, survived her attempt to commit suicide by jumping from the Clifton suspension bridge. The drop to the water below is about 75 metres.

May 10th 2021: A safari park in eastern China was heavily criticised after it took nearly a week to notify police and residents that 3 leopards had escaped and were roaming around local suburbs.

May 19th 1910: Halley's Comet had a (relatively) close encounter with the planet Earth, passing within 13.9 million miles. It was thought at the time that toxic gases in the comet's tail might wipe out all life on Earth. In reality the gases are so diffused that no damage was done as the planet passed through the tail of the comet. However, that did not stop some panic buying, especially in the USA, of gas masks, "anti-comet pills" and even "anti-comet umbrellas".

May 21st 1420: Following the English victory at the battle of Agincourt in 1415, the treaty of Troyes was signed, making Henry V the ruler of France. Henry was now permitted to marry Princess Catherine de Valois and he would become king on the death of Charles de Valois. It was hoped that this would ensure perpetual peace between the two countries.

May 24th 1941: British battlecruiser HMS Hood, engaged in an operation to sink the German battleship Bismarck, was sunk by gunfire from the Bismarck itself and the Prinz Eugen. A German shell hit the magazine and after an enormous explosion the Hood sunk rapidly and only 3 members of the crew of 1418 men survived. The Bismarck then headed for the port of Brest in occupied France but was intercepted by British ships and aircraft which sunk it on May 26th.

May 27th 1958: American rock singer Jerry Lee Lewis was forced to abandon his tour of the UK when the press broke the news not only that his (third) wife Myra, who was travelling with him, was his cousin but also that she was only 13 years old.

May 31st 2009: Millvina Dean, the last known living survivor of the sinking of the Titanic, died in Ashurst, Hampshire at the age of 97. She was the youngest passenger on the ship at just 9 weeks old when it went down.

OUR UNIVERSE INSIDE-OUT

I showed, last time, that the absolute constants of nature that control the universe are not by chance. The values such as the charge on the electron and its mass are absolutely critical for stars to form, otherwise they would not start, or would instantly explode, which would prevent synthesis of carbon and all the elements, and consequently prevent ourselves from ever perceiving any universe. That makes the whole universe observer-dependent, the Anthropic Principle. It exists because of our imagination to see it so, and vice versa!

There is an alternative. In the laboratory, the electron's properties can take very slightly different values according to how they are observed, even though they are implied by measurement to be the same throughout the universe. On the quantum mechanics scale of particles, their properties are not independent. For example, mass and charge are forms of energy and the perception of energy as different forms is dependent on relative observer to object speed. Inertia of an object, that is its resistance to acceleration, is interpreted as mass, and is perceived to be greater at relativistic speed than when static because it requires ever more energy to accelerate it faster out of proportion so never achieving the speed of light.

In the unproven bizarre world of string theory where particles are considered as the ends of tiny vibrating strings, the number of stable possible solutions involving the physical constants are like islands of stability with no preference, in an ocean of infinite possible solutions with no stability. If so, then there are infinite solutions out of far more, for our existence-universe, but which one?

Here I try to answer, what is outside the universe? And what was before the beginning? A simple model visualising the surface of an expanding balloon answers these and more.

Most people asking about the size of the universe are thinking of a ball viewed from the outside, or possibly from the inside. This is a comprehensible model and assumes there is an inside, outside and surface between.

A ball's surface is curved in two dimensions from any point on its surface; always viewed radially as a two-dimensional projection through our eyes. The universe has three spatial dimensions and one of time. It actually has at least 11, but that is for another time. We cannot imagine curvature in three dimensions so we suppress one of them. Which is what we're doing when we are imagining it as a balloon seen from outside in an additional dimension. The real observer is in the universe, so is in our immersive surface model; it is seen as a continuous surface only, with no curvature or edge. Curvature of surface and edge are only in the higher dimension and so only seen by the higher dimension observer.

In the imagination higher dimension model, an insect crawling round this surface universe would find no end but come back to the beginning. In fact, the universe is continually expanding, so the ball becomes an inflating balloon. In the case of the insect, in the time it attempts to get round the circumference, the surface has expanded, so it never gets round it; analogous to a traveller attempting to navigate through the universe. Even at light speed, the circuit is never completed. So, the experience is that the universe has an infinite size, there is always more to get through. Imagine the balloon continually being blown up, has ink-dots at random all over the surface, then these represent galaxies. Wherever we place the true observer on the surface then every point is moving apart from them, the further away the dots, the more rubber is stretching and the faster they seem to be parting. There is no preferable position on the surface. The surface itself has no centre, all points are alike. An observer located anywhere on the surface sees every point moving from them, increasingly according distance. The higher dimension observer can see that it is just the balloon evenly expanding. This is how the universe is; its forever expansion eliminates perception of any curvature so it appears to be flat and infinite.

In our immersive model it has no edge and therefore no inside or outside. It is everything that can be observed and much more that cannot be; that which cannot be reached in any measurable time. Then nothing can escape it (to me, this is the definition of a black hole) and is everything, so must represent the whole of space-time.

The imagination model of the surface of a rubber balloon expanding is a good representation of our universe, and answers many questions. If we pass through the surface a higher dimensional object, it is seen on the surface universe as a wall appearing and disappearing, particles instantly created and destroyed, and this actually happens.

The universe has an origin in time, about 13.8 billion years ago as we look out and back. If we think of a balloon with the mass of the universe, it would naturally collapse under its own gravitational attraction, just normal gravity. The further we look out, the further back in time we are looking, so we are basically looking at a collapse in time-reverse which is perceived as an expansion at the same rate.

Nothing is before time started; with our concept of the surface of a balloon at all times (size), that is equivalent to asking what is north of the north pole on the earth's surface?

We can't see back to the beginning because the further we look, the acceleration increases (as here slowing down) so no information reaches us; a universe infinitely small yet all around us. In the early period it was proportionally compressed, so at a high temperature and opaque like the inside of a star; an obscuring barrier. We know the particle formation processes and subsequent nuclear reactions that occurred from about one 10-millionth of a second to a few minutes because we can see them in the large Hadron Collider and are familiar with the processes just as in the stars which followed.

Why is the sky dark at night? Watch this space for answers to this and other common questions using the same model, more on particle creation and destruction from nothing. **To be continued.**

Unusual financial requests: Never respond to any requests to send money, or have money transferred through your account, by someone you don't know and trust.

Secure your accounts: You can protect your important online accounts by using a strong separate password and, where available, turn on two-factor authentication (2FA).

If you have made a payment: Inform your bank, or payment service provider, such as PayPal, as soon as possible. They can help you prevent any further losses. You should also monitor your bank statements regularly for any unusual activity.

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
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
